From the Desk: Steve Martin President Tasmanian Branch

Commissioner for Children and Young People

Leanne McLean was appointed Tasmanian Commissioner for Children and Young People in November 2018, with the role to promote the rights and wellbeing of Tasmanian Children and young people – including that their rights are considered and respected by adults when making decisions that may affect children.

From the meeting with Commissioner McLean, our general discussion highlighted:

Tasmania's first Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy

The Tasmanian Government is developing Tasmania's first Child and Youth Wellbeing Strategy for 0-25 year olds. The strategy will have a specific focus on the **first 1,000 days** (from pregnancy to baby's first 2 years).

They are seeking the views and ideas of Tasmanian children, young people, their caregivers, and the service sector to help develop the Strategy. You can have your say by **getting creative**, sending the Premier a **postcard**, completing a short **survey**, or making a formal submission to the **Discussion Paper**.

Consultation partners include, the Commissioner for Children and Young People, the Youth Network of Tasmania and the Mental Health Council of Tasmania. Playgroup Tasmania are also holding face to face conversations state-wide.

Part of the consultation revolved around several areas with the item of interest being LEARNING. "Learning is a lifelong activity that can be done anytime, anywhere. There are opportunities to learn all around us, no matter what age children, young people and adults are."

What learning means to children and young people:

- Participating in early childhood education
- Developing numeracy and literacy skills appropriate to age
- Being supported to learn by their caregiver and education provider
- Receiving assistance for additional needs
- Attending and engaging in education, training, or employment

Consultation closed on 19th March 2021.

One outcome of the consultation was the launch, by Commissioner McLean, of the children's picture book "When I wake up and smile", which captures the views of children aged 4-8 years from selected schools on what well-being means to them.

Whilst there is a report/strategy being formed, importantly, the medium utilised to communicate was a children's picture story book. Such reinforces the work by children's book creators and the messages and learning experiences that they bring to a child, their family, and their community.

B4 Early Years Coalition

B4 Early Years Coalition (or B4 for short) is a movement for change to ensure every child in Tasmania is cared for and nurtured through the early years, no matter what. The name 'B4' represents the early years of a child's life – pregnancy to age four – before a child begins full-time school and the period before birth.

The B4 Early Years Coalition is co-chaired by Elizabeth Daly (former Chair of the Tasmanian Early Years Foundation) and Leanne McLean (Tasmania's Commissioner for Children and Young People).

"What we experience in our early years has a lasting impact on our mind, brain, and body. The time from pregnancy until age four is the most rapid period of development in our lives. What happens during this time provides the foundation for all future learning, behaviour, and health. By providing children with the opportunities and environments for healthy development, we give them the best foundation for current – and future – physical, emotional, and social wellbeing."

To get the best start in life children need: -

- Loving and secure relationships
- Healthy food and environments
- Positive and inclusive communities
- A sense of belonging
- Access to services and support

Governor of Tasmania

The term of the Governor of Tasmania, Her Excellency, Professor, the Honourable Kate Warner AC has now expired, with Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II approving Ms Barbara Butler as our next Governor, commencing June 9, 2021.

Ms Baker retired as a judge of the Federal Circuit Court of Australia in January 2021, after becoming the first Tasmanian woman to be appointed as a Federal Magistrate in 2008. In looking through Ms Baker's biography, I caution anybody that might have the idea of challenging Ms Baker to a game of Royal Tennis, Lawn Tennis or hockey, being a champion in each of those sports.

Since February 2015, CBCA Tasmania has enjoyed Joint Patronage from Her Excellency Kate Warner and Mr. Warner, providing further credibility to our organisation, enabling us to coordinate programs and activities, and to endorse and promote quality books for children and young people.

Their generosity in hosting the national 2017 Book of the Year Award announcements at Government House, was very much appreciated, not only providing the opportunity for attendees to celebrate the outstanding contributions to Australian children's literacy, but to also experience the grandeur of the 1857 sandstone Government House via private tours, guided by their staff.

On behalf of the Children's Book Council of Australia, Tasmanian Branch, our creators, readers, and listeners, I conveyed our thanks and gratitude for their continued support and kindness during the past six years, and with this year's Book Week theme being *Old Worlds, New Worlds and Other Worlds*, conveyed our best wishes for their next journey to whichever World they may choose.

Premier's Literary Awards

Since the March Newsletter, there has been some movement of support for an increase in prizemoney and hopefully expansion in categories, especially that of a specific Children's Book. All three major political parties have provided an indication of support.

Later this month, a meeting has been secured with the Minister for Arts Elise Archer MP and that of Shadow Minister for Education Josh Willie MLC to reinforce the want and need. Invitations to meet with Minister for Education Sarah Courtney and Shadow Minister for the Arts Jenna Butler have also been offered.

Children's Book Council of Australia

At the last Board Meeting of the CBCA, the current Chairperson Wendy Rapee (NSW) was re-elected unopposed with current Vice Chairperson Jane Moore

(SA) also re-elected unopposed. This now should provide a positive foundation to move forward, especially now that Book Week $21^{st} - 27^{th}$ August draws.

The Board has a lot of work to get through, including gaining a better understanding of their Constitution, and that of organising a national conference for 2022. It all presents wonderful opportunities for a New World.

Early Childhood Australia

New research from the Fralin Biomedical Research Institute, University of Pennsylvania, has revealed the effects of stimulating and emotionally supportive learning experiences during the first five years of a child's life can still be seen in their adult brain structure four decades later.

An enhanced learning environment during the first five years of life shapes the brain in ways that are apparent four decades later, say Virginia Tech and University of Pennsylvania scientists writing in the June edition of the Journal of Cognitive Neuroscience.

The researchers used structural brain imaging to detect the developmental effects of linguistic and cognitive stimulation starting at six weeks of age in infants. The influence of an enriched environment on brain structure had formerly been demonstrated in animal studies, but this is the first experimental study to find a similar result in humans.

"Our research shows a relationship between brain structure and five years of high-quality educational and social experiences," said Craig Ramey, professor, and distinguished research scholar with the <u>Fralin Biomedical Research Institute at VTC</u> and principal investigator of the study. "We have demonstrated that in vulnerable children who received stimulating and emotionally supportive learning experiences, statistically significant changes in brain structure appear in middle age."

The results support the idea that early environment influences the brain structure of individuals growing up with multi-risk socioeconomic challenges, said Martha Farah, director of the Centre for Neuroscience & Society at University of Pennsylvania, author of the study




75 Years of CBCA Book of the Year Awards

In 1946 CBCA awarded the first **Book of the Year Award** to Leslie Rees for *Karrawingi the Emu*. In 2017 when Mem Fox received the Nan Chauncy Award for contribution to Children's Literature, she spoke about the influence Leslie Rees had on her as a child. In her acceptance speech she said:

"Like many children living outside Australia, my sisters and I were riveted by Australian animals, a fascination enhanced by the long picture-story-books of **Leslie Rees**. My favourite of his was *Shy, The Platypus*. I loved it so much that in the late 80's, when I was reading Walter McVitty's book: *Authors and Illustrators of Australian Children's Books* and discovered to my amazement that Leslie Rees was still alive and living at Balmoral Beach in Sydney, I wrote to him. I told him I'd adored his books and that his work had greatly influenced my becoming a writer. Unbelievably I was asked to dinner by this silver-haired god, who was 85 by then and still living alone. I did go to dinner with him, even though he lived in Sydney and I live in Adelaide. I confess I could hardly speak a sensible word. It was like an Elvis fan having dinner with Elvis."




Although 'Shy' has not been noted in the awards, other Rees titles were noted in 1947, 1948 and 1950.

In 1952 the award category was split to include the **Picture Book of the Year Award** (Under 8); the Book of the Year award covered readers from 8 to 15 years. The Picture Book of the Year Award was not presented until 1956, when Sheila Hawkins and Peggy Barnard won with *Wish and the Magic Nut*. Since 1986 this award has been presented every year, but there were many years prior to this, when books were highly commended, but not deemed award worthy. Ron Brooks and Dick Roughley are mentioned in 1974, Pamela

Allen in 1981 and Julia Vivas in 1982.

In 2001 an additional category was added: **Book of the Year Early Childhood.** This genre of books split away from the picture book category. Picture Book of the Year in 1994 was *First Light* Peter Gouldthorpe and Gary Crew; in 1995 *The Watertower* Stephen Woolman and Gary Crew; and in 1999 *The Rabbits* by

Shaun Tan/John Marsden. It was evident that a picture book format was evolving that was not aimed at the Under 8s.




2021 shortlisted author/illustrator Bob Graham (*Ellie's Dragon*) received a Commended for *First There was Francis* in 1984: featuring in the awards for 37 years! Mem Fox was first listed in 1984 for and most recently in 2018: 34 years!

Prior to 1982 the following authors appeared as winners or highly commended over numerous years: Patricia Wrightson, Ivan Southall, Colin Thiele, Nan Chauncy and Ruth Park. *Playing Beattie Bow* by Ruth Park was the final recipient of the original single


category awards. In 1983 the now biennial Nan Chauncy Award was instituted.

In 1952 Eve Pownall both won the award for *The Australia Book* and was a notable mention for *Cousins-Come-Lately*. In 1988 Eve Pownall's family created the **Eve Pownall Award**. The recipient was *My Place* by Nadia Wheatley and Donna Rawlins. The award was not presented again until 1993, when CBCA continued the award in recognition of Eve Pownall's contribution to information books. The 1993 recipients were Gracie Greene and Joe Tramacchi for *Tjarany Roughtail: the Dreaming of the*



Roughtail Lizard and other stories told by Kukatja; Illustrated by Lucille Gill. The Award recipients in 2012 were Alison Lester (author) and Coral Tulloch (ill) for *One Small Island*. Coral is one of our Creators in Schools presenters.

In 1953 CBCA NSW Branch created an award for the **Best Illustrated Book of the Year**, and joint winners were *Good Luck to the Rider* by Margaret Horder and Joan Phipson and *David and his Australian Friends* by Noella Young and



Enid Bell. The intention was for this to be an annual award but this didn't eventuate. Between 1974 and 1976 the Visual Arts Board awarded prizes for the best illustrated book of the year. The inaugural award was *Mulga Bill's Bicycle* illustrated by Kilmeny and Deborah Niland, with text by A.B. Paterson. From 1977-1987 the prize money donated by the Visual Arts Board was shared amongst the winning illustrators in the Picture Book of the Year category. In 1988 CBCA Victoria Branch used a bequest by Mr

Wallace Raymond Chricton to fund the **Chricton Award for New Illustrators.** The inaugural winner was *The Pheasant and the Kingfisher* by Raymond Meeks. In 2019 this award became part of the Book of the Year Awards and CBCA renamed it the **The CBCA New Illustrator Award** which was won by another Workshops in Schools creator, Daniel Gray-Barnett, with *Grandma Z*.

In conclusion, my favourites.

From the original **Book of the Year** category: I can't choose between *Playing Beattie Bow* by Ruth Park (1981) and *The Ice is Coming* by Patricia Wrightson (1978).




Book of the Year Older Readers: *Master of the Grove* by Victor Kelleher (1983)

The Nan Chauncy Award A Biennial Award of the Children's Book Council of Australia

From the late 1950s until the early 1970s, Nan Chauncy was one of the most esteemed children's writers in Australia.

She distinguished herself by winning the Australian Children's Book of the Year three times, had three titles commended in the following seven years and gained international recognition, including receiving a Diploma of Merit in the Hans Christian Andersen Award (Eastman, B. 2000; Lees, S. & Macintyre, P. 1993; Niall, B. 1984).

In recognition of the writer's significance in the history of literature for young Australians, CBCA instituted the Nan Chauncy Award in 1983. The award is currently conferred biennially.

The CBCA Nan Chauncy Award has been created to honour a person who has made an outstanding contribution to the field of Australian Children's Literature over a period of years. Such a person could be an editor, publisher, teacher, librarian, bookseller, researcher, lecturer, author, illustrator, etc.

The Award is an opportunity to recognise an individual whose dedicated work in advocacy and promotion of literature and literacy might otherwise not be publicly celebrated.

MEDIA RELEASE The Children's Book Council of Australia announces the winner of the 2021 Nan Chauncy Award

A 'living treasure' of the Western Australian children's literature community was today awarded the prestigious Nan Chauncy Award.

The Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) Chair Wendy Rapee announced Jan Nicholls as winner of the 2021 Nan Chauncy Award, which

honours people who have made an outstanding contribution to Australian children's literature.

Ms Rapee said Nicholls' enduring and passionate commitment to children's literature was inspiring.

"Jan is highly respected and admired by the West Australian children's book community and beyond," Ms Rapee said.

"In addition to her decades-long professional career as a teacher librarian, where she has encouraged thousands of students to develop a love of reading, she has also dedicated countless volunteer hours to professional organisations that advocate for Australian children's and young adult literature and its creators."

Nicholls was a teacher librarian at St Mary's Anglican Girls' School for almost 30 years from 1987 to 2015.

From 1992 she volunteered at the newly established Fremantle Children's Literature Centre (renamed The Literature Centre in 2012) and was one of the first teacher librarians to support their Talented Young Writers' Programme.

In her letter of support of Nicholls' Nan Chauncy Award nomination, Founder and Director of The Literature Centre Lesley Reece AM described Nicholls as "quite simply, a living treasure of the WA children's and young adult scene".

Nicholls joined the CBCA WA in 2007 and has held several key roles including two terms as President: 2009 to 2012 and 2017 to 2021.

Over the years, she has been involved with the Association of Independent Schools WA Libraries (AISWA Libraries), the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators (SCBWI) and the International Board of Books for Young People (IBBY) and served as a judge for The Western Australian Premier's Book Awards and the Tim Winton Award for Young Writers several times. Award-winning author Meg McKinlay acknowledged Nicholl's tireless support for the WA children's writing community.

"I am just one among many WA creators who can say that our career trajectories owe a significant debt to the advocacy and activities of the CBCA WA and by extension to Jan's excellent, unswerving stewardship," McKinlay said.

Established in 1983 and named after the noted Tasmanian children's author, the biennial Nan Chauncy Award will be formally presented on Friday August 20 at the CBCA Book of the Year Awards event, to be held at Government House South Australia.

Finally, thank you for the gifts of appreciation and the generous support over my four-year term as President of the Tasmanian Branch of CBCA.


