From the Desk: President Steve Martin Tasmanian Branch

Having no literature background, my personal aim in joining the Tasmanian Branch of the CBCA in 2016 was to find out more about children's literature and literacy and how those learnings might benefit my community, Devonport; specifically low social economic areas in and around the city. What I discovered was old worlds, new worlds, and other worlds, which fits into this year's Book Week theme.

Old worlds conveyed to me old thinking and the need to move into a new world of thinking - a new world that would be inclusive and recognise other worlds; such as the biennial Premier's Literary Prizes, previously known as the Tasmanian Literacy Prizes (2017).

It is wonderful that our state recognises literature through such prizes, but it is concerning that our state seems to short-change our home grown creators by only offering a small range of genres to biennially recognise and reward, with the total prize pool totalling \$40,000 every two years: -

- Tasmania Book Prize for best book with Tasmanian content in any genre \$25,000 and is an open award. Plus People's Choice Award
- Margaret Scott Prize for best book by a Tasmanian writer \$5,000. Plus People's Choice Award
- University of Tasmania Prize for best unpublished work by an emerging Tasmanian writer \$5,000. Plus People's Choice Award

• **Tasmanian Young Writer's Fellowship** – awarded to young emerging writers aged 30 years and under – \$5,000.

The old world lumps a broad sweep of genres together to compete for the major open prize of \$25,000. The difficulty here is: how does a Tasmanian cookbook compete against a children's picture story book, against historic non-fiction, against poetry or a fictional love story thriller? Surely, new world thinking should be applied to recognise and include other worlds and recognised them with their own prize?

It is noted that in other worlds (Australian states), other genres are recognised separately, awarded their own prize - annually. Perhaps, as we move into a new universal phase, Arts Tasmania would look at recognising the richly talented and diverse range of literature about Tasmania, in Tasmania and by Tasmanians, to annually include and recognise separately other worlds, such as children's literature and poetry?

In 2019, the Prizes attracted a record total of 198 books, manuscripts and writing samples across only 4 categories, "...a clear demonstration of the talent and enthusiasm across Tasmania's literary sector, which is an important and valued part of our arts sector." Elise Archer, Minister for Arts 5th December 2019.

Now imagine, if we discovered new worlds (categories), how many other worlds (entries) would be found? Such should be put to Minister Archer and Arts Tasmania for consideration.

- Victoria annual prize pool \$265,500, 6 categories, plus People's Choice in each category
- New South Wales annual prize pool \$305,000, 13 categories, plus a People's Choice Award
- Queensland annual prize pool \$125,000, 7 categories, plus a People's Choice Award
- South Australia annual pool prize \$167,500, 11 categories
- Western Australia annual prize pool \$105,000, 4 categories by an author or authors residing in Western Australia
- Australian Capital Territory annual \$10,000 Book of the Year + \$2,000 each for Highly Commended + \$1,000 each for short listed - by ACT-based authors published in the previous calendar year
- Northern Territory annual prize pool \$5,700, 7 categories, celebrating unpublished work of Northern Territory writers

Devonport Readers' Cup

This year's event will be conducted on Friday 12th November, tentatively at Devonport's paranaple centre. Last year, the competition was opened up to Latrobe and Kentish municipalities, with Port Sorell, Latrobe and Sheffield schools entering. Already we have received confirmation from several schools committing to the event.

Vale Berenice Eastman

CBCA Tasmania Life Member Berenice Eastman, a Hobart based author who had a contagious love of literature and a "dangerous" level of honesty, has died after an amazing 93 years on the planet.

Berenice was a much beloved member of Tasmania's writing community and author of *Nan Chauncy, A Writer's Life* and *My Capacious Hold-all*. Berenice was the spouse of Wal Eastman, and mother of Virginia, Merridy and John.

The Devonport Readers' Cup is a truly wonderful event. I am honoured to have been asked to be a part of this day of celebration of ideas and I feel incredibly privileged to have been with the teachers and students on this day, along with the dedicated organisers and judges.

The day itself is the culmination of a great deal of organisation and passion to provide an event that enables all students (at all stages of learning within their year groups) to develop a love of reading, research and creativity.

Each school worked hard to present at the Readers' Cup and worked beautifully together in their groups to help each other in answering the questions and to perform their creative piece to the audience. The children involved had worked on their own to read the books and then worked together with their group. What I really loved about the Cup was that each individual was supported and applauded for their own ideas and each group also worked collaboratively. Their respect and honour of each other was evident.

So many events are competitive, (and even though there are winners of sections in the Devonport Readers' Cup) the entire event has nothing at all to do with winning or losing. For me, this was incredible as the event encourages each child, each group, to be a part of the whole and to celebrate everyone there. This encourages children, inspires and excites them, giving them a love of reading, of learning and of celebrating this together as a community.

There was so much combined joy in that room that day. Steve Martin was sensational at making all the children and all the school communities feel valued, supported and a major part of the day.

This is a fabulous model of learning and collaboration. I hope that this model ideal could be used widely in our society.

Competition Encourages Reading

The hotly contested Devonport Readers' Cup interschool competition was held, for the fourth year, in November 2020. Teams of primary school pupils read six books and competed with other schools to answer quiz questions. Each school entered a team of six members who were provided with the selected books. The teams also presented a five-minute creative skit based on an interpretation of the books.

The competition, hosted by the Devonport City Council, was held on November 13th at the paranaple convention centre. Steve Martin said he started the Cup while in office to encourage reading not only among the competitors but to promote and recognise reading and children's literature.

2020 competing schools included: Devonport Christian School, Devonport Primary School, Hillcrest Primary School, Latrobe Primary School, Miandetta Primary School, Nixon Street Primary School, Port Sorell Primary School and Spreyton Primary School. Judges were Devonport Mayor Annette Rockliff, Latrobe Mayor Peter Freshney, Past President of the Children's Book Council of Australia, Tasmanian Branch Leanne Rands, Northern Tasmanian Broadcasters Manager Sylvia Sayers, and illustrator Coral Tulloch.

Steve Martin - CBCAs New President

Steve Martin brings a wide range of experience and skills to the role of Tasmanian Branch President that will benefit CBCA, particularly during this time of change.

Steve has had nine years' experience in local government, seven of those as Mayor of Devonport. He represented the council on regional organisations and intergovernmental forums at regional, state and federal levels as well as chairperson of the council.

He is also a former Senator with an understanding in dealing with governance issues, organisational compliance and structural functions. Steve is skilled in fundraising and building partnerships with local government bodies, community groups and schools.

Recent CBCA involvement:

- Steve, during his term as a Senator in 2018, organized a Federal grant to develop the Workshops in Schools Program which was established in 2019 finishing in December 2022. This grant is administered as a partnership between CBCA Tasmania and the Department of Education, Tasmania.
- Formerly a Tasmanian Branch Committee Member and Branch Secretary, Steve has now been elected Branch President.
- He organized and conducted the Readers' Cups in Smithton and Devonport for local primary schools.
- Whilst Devonport Mayor, Steve instituted a Literacy Ambassador role. Mem Fox, as Ambassador, worked closely with children and their parents from the lower socio-economic areas of Devonport.
- Steve created the Toast for Kids Charity Inc. raising funds for 16 school breakfast clubs and the Books for Babies program which promotes reading aloud to children. The Branch is currently partnering with the Toast for Kids Charity to develop a unique Tasmanian book created by a local illustrator and author to be distributed to all newborn babies across the state.



The many diverse workshops will enable delegate participation and be available on line for teachers to utilise with their students.


2021 CBCA Shortlist Announcement March 30 at noon

Dr Heidi Auman presents Garbage Guts

Dr Heidi Auman was our guest speaker at the AGM held on 7th November 2020.

Heidi has been a seabird biologist for the past 25 years focussing on the human impact of plastic debris ingestion, toxicology, physiology and urbanisation in various parts of the world. She shared her research and outlined



the global extent of the marine pollution problem.



Her book *Garbage Guts* was written to raise the awareness of children to this devastating problem on seabirds through the experiences of Aria the Albatross and her seabird friends. When Aria sets out on a long-distance flight across the Pacific Ocean, she meets other wildlife having trouble with rubbish. Monk Seal is trapped by a strapping band, Humpback Whale is hopelessly tangled in a ghost fishing net, and Sea Turtle is choking on a plastic bag he thought was a jellyfish. Oncebeautiful beaches, reefs and open oceans are littered by discarded fishing gear, disposable

lighters, plastic bags and bottle caps, creating unimaginable hazards for the creatures that live there.

Heidi implored the audience to be responsible with disposing of rubbish!

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE. We all know this. But even better yet, REFUSE single use plastics in the first place! Our ecological footprint is so massive, we all need to change our behaviours and lower our consumption. Reducing our plastic use is just the first step. With every choice that you make, you can create a better world!


NEW BOOKS: reviews by Pinerolo

BINDI by Kirli Saunders, illus by Dub Leffler (Magabala).

This wonderful book, winner of the Daisy Utemorrah Award, is a verse novel, written using both Gundungurra language and English. It's a moving, sensitive and evocative story of a young girl, her family, her animals, her friends and her Country. In the aftermath of devastating bushfires, it is written as a call to action for young people to understand their role in conservation and caring for Country. Indigenous illustrator Dub Leffler's exquisite illustrations and the superb production make this book a winner.



TOOK THE CHILDREN AWAY by Archie Roach, illus by Ruby Hunter (Simon & Schuster).

This important book includes the lyrics of this iconic song, with illustrations by his partner and collaborator, Ruby Hunter, as well as his own memories of his family and historical photographs. It was the last project they worked on together before she died in 2010. A moving and touching tribute that will introduce this song to many new readers.




ANEMONE IS NOT THE ENEMY by Anna McGregor (Scribble).


THE FIRE WOMBAT by Jackie French, illus by Danny Snell. (A & R).

Another fascinating, beautifully illustrated and produced new non-fiction book. Packed with information and clearly designed and set out.




I'M A HERO TOO by Jamila Rizvi, illus by Peter Cheong (Puffin).
