Picture Book / New Illustrator Categories - SARAH MAYOR COX



The Tasmanian Literary Awards 2022

Great News – after lobbying Minister for Arts Elise Archer (March 2021) to expand the Tasmanian Literacy Awards to include other genres (especially a young readers and children's category); to restrict submissions to Tasmanian creators only and to increase the prize pool, the Awards were announced...



On 8 September 2021 the Minister for the Arts Elise Archer announced that the Tasmanian Literary Awards will be held in 2022. Tasmania's unique and vibrant culture is one of our most treasured assets, and our State has its own story to tell. Formerly known as the Premiers' Literary Prizes, the biennial Tasmanian Literary Awards will offer more opportunities to better recognise excellence in the literary sector. The Tasmanian Government has increased its biennial prize money investment from \$25 000 to \$100 000 to support awards in six new categories:

- a prize for fiction (\$25 000)
- a prize for non-fiction (\$25 000)
- a prize for young readers and children (\$25 000)
- a prize for Indigenous writing (\$10 000)

- a prize for poetry and short stories (\$10 000)
- a young writers fellowship (\$5 000)

The University of Tasmania will also continue to support prizes as part of the new Tasmanian Literary Awards.

The Tasmanian Government’s literary awards have been largely unchanged since 2007. These significant changes will allow the Tasmanian Government to:

- focus on supporting the Tasmanian writing community
- align with our ongoing commitment to promoting the Tasmanian Brand, and
- fulfil the objectives of the Creative and Cultural Industries

Nominations for the Awards are now open, providing an opportunity to honour the achievements of our local writing community, raise the profile of Tasmanian authors, and foster emerging literary talent in our state.

OK, so a nest is a home – Launch


The Commissioner for Children and Young People Leanne McLean in the first week of June launched a new book, ‘OK, so a nest is a home – Views and experiences of Tasmanian children and young people in out-of-home care’. Ms McLean said an important part of her role as Commissioner is to promote and empower the participation of children and young people in the making of decisions, or the expressing of opinions, on matters that may affect their lives – including children living in Out of Home Care in Tasmania which includes foster care, kinship care and residential care in Tasmania.

“Every night, about 1100 Tasmanian children and young people are in out-of-home care. That is about 1 in every 100 or 1% of children and young people in communities across the State,” Ms McLean said. “In 2021-22, as part of my Out-

of-Home Care Monitoring Program, it was my great pleasure to undertake a series of creative consultations and discussions with children and young people with a care experience to explore the theme of 'Being Loved and Safe'."

"Later this year my office will release a report around the theme of Being Loved and Safe. But right now, I want to draw everyone's focus to what Tasmanian children and young people have told me themselves about the safety and stability of their lives," said Ms McLean. "There is so much we can learn when we listen to what children and young people have to say – this beautiful book contains heartfelt insights about what is and is not working well for some children and young people in out-of-home care.

Ellie has professional experience working with young people and has leapt into primary schools, complete with costumes and props, and is excited to offer interactive workshops.


Tassie Talent: Anne Morgan

Shadow Judging 2022

Tasmania is excited to be included in the CBCA Book of the Year Shadow Judging. A trial was held in Victoria in 2021, and funding was awarded under the RISE Grants (Australian Government Arts and Cultural Development Program).

Eleven Tasmanian Schools were awarded RISE funding, and a further 8 have been supported to the same level, using the Federal Government Grant awarded to CBCA Tasmania in 2019. The 2019-2022 grant has also paid the \$50 registration fee for all 19 schools.



Each group has been able to order one set of the books for their category (value \$120), has access to booking a Creator visit (up to \$600 funded), received an ePUBfile of the resource '*A Literature Companion for Teachers*' 2nd ed from CBCA partner - the Primary English Teaching Association Australia (PETAA), has access to the Shadow Judging website and its resources; and Younger Reader and Early Childhood groups are offered a complimentary Story Box Library subscription.

Each Shadow Judging group selected the category they wanted to judge: Five groups are judging the Older Reader Category, seven the Younger Reader, two Early Childhood, and five the Picture Book. Each group also has a CBCA mentor to help guide them through the process.

Each group is asked to judge the books against the same five criteria the CBCA Judges use:

- 1.Literary merit: aesthetic qualities of language, standing the test of time, realistic characters
- 2.Cohesiveness: language, theme, style
- 3.Appeal to the readership
- 4.Quality: illustrations, book design, production, editing
- 5.Originality

The way in which each group approaches this is determined by the in-school coordinator of the group.

By the end of July each group will need to have selected one winner from their six books and upload this vote to the Shadow Judging website. On August 26 (the end of Book Week) there will be an online announcement of which book was judged by the Shadow Judges to be the winner. You may wish to visit the

The program hasn't been without its glitches: one of the major difficulties has been access to all 6 titles (a publishing glitch) and that decisions are being made as the program progresses. For those of us who like all the information at our fingertips, this has been a bit daunting!


However, this program has been an amazing opportunity for over 200 school groups Australia wide. Unfortunately grant funding for this project is not available in 2023, and as our grant will be close to being expended, CBCA Tas may not be able to support groups to the same extent in 2023. However, President Steve Martin is working hard on continued funding for CBCA Tas.

You may have noticed the SUN Project banner linked to this Shadow Judging program. The SUN Project is an umbrella term for further initiatives being rolled out nationally by CBCA – so watch this space for news!

Book Review: Invisibly Grace by Avery McDougall

Moving to another state in the third term of Grade 10 would provide any student with challenges. When Grace arrives in Launceston, she insists that she is not going to be the “sick girl” and attempts to hide her autoimmune disease from her fellow students. Grace’s family is supportive, especially her sister Ivy who plays a major role in Grace’s life. The students are typical – some are vicious, others (Jenna and Daniel, a fellow trivia buff) become close friends.

Autoimmune diseases can be complex and difficult to diagnose; sufferers may be told their pain is psychosomatic. Diagnosis isn't the end; medication has side effects and tolerances for different drugs vary. Avery McDougall writes from her own experience and from comments from other immunocompromised young adults. Books like *Invisibly Grace* are important not just for those who wish to see themselves represented; they are important for all of us.
