## **Tasmanian Literary Awards Shortlist**

On Tuesday November 15, Minister for the Arts, Elise Archer, announced the Shortlisted books for the former Premier's Book Awards now the Tasmanian Literary Awards.

As you recall from the July newsletter: Steve Martin, CBCA Tas President, lobbied the Minister for Arts to expand the Tasmanian Literacy Awards to include other genres (especially a young readers and children's category) and to restrict submissions to Tasmanian creators only and to increase the prize pool.

The Minister for the Arts' Prize for Books for Young Readers and Children shortlisted books are:

- Aster's Good, Right Things by Kate Gordon (Yellow Brick Books)
- Ella and the Ocean by Lian Tanner, illustrated by Jonathan Bentley (Allen & Unwin)
- Sea Country by Aunty Patsy Cameron, illustrated by Lisa Kennedy (Magabala Books)
- Shoestring: The Boy Who Walks on Air by Julie Hunt, illustrated by Dale Newman (Allen & Unwin)

#### Judges' comments on the shortlist

This year's shortlist for the Minister for the Arts' Prize for Books for Young Readers and Children represents the breadth of forms, genres, and audiences in Tasmanian children's writing, demonstrating that the power of language and complexity in a literary work is by no means restricted to texts composed for adults. In an extremely competitive field, all the authors and illustrators for this category should be congratulated on the high quality of the work that they offer young Tasmanians.

The judges' chosen picture books, *Sea Country* by Aunty Patsy Cameron and *Ella and the Ocean* by Lian Tanner, both utilise powerful interconnection of word and image to transport their readers into explorations of deep connections with landscape and country. Julie Hunt's *Shoestring: The Boy Who Walks on Air* is an illustrated novel that takes readers on a fantastical thrill-ride, filled with magic and mayhem, while *Aster's Good, Right Things* by Kate Gordon explores a vital theme for our time: how do we embrace difference and try to do good in the world?

The judging panel for the award are confident that the shortlist for this award clearly represents the exemplary calibre of Tasmanian writing for young people, which is world-class in every aspect and to be commended to readers of all ages. The shortlist was selected with an eye to a number of elements of quality, but the

factor considered above all others was the power of the authors' storytelling to touch both the mind and heart of the reader in a profound way. The four books nominated were unanimously considered by the judges to have this quality in abundance.



# Book Review: Come Over to My House by Eliza Hull and Sally Rippin Illustrated by Daniel Gray-Barnett

Readers are invited to seven unique homes to eat, play, dance, jump, read and do many other everyday activities. In every home, there is one or more people with a disability – a child or parent or both. In these homes, the visitor has to adapt to the physical, neurodivergent or intellectual disabilities of those who live there.

The illustrations by award-winning Tasmanian based Daniel Gray-Barnett are colourful, vibrant and most importantly respectful of the story being told - an excellent way to introduce children to people with disabilities and to learn how they might do things differently.

# **Book Review: Michael Maggot by Thomas Shire**

Michael the Mad Maggot is a new publication from first time author Thomas Shires. A farmer in Tasmania, he focuses on sustainable farming practices and regenerating the landscape. And this may well have influenced the setting of this story – a compost bin! What better place to celebrate sustainable living!

The story of Michael expressly addresses anger management as this maggot struggles to hold his temper and has no patience dealing with life's challenge which can be rather gross when living in compost. And it seems that everything makes him mad – the slightest thing can set him off. As a maggot,



Michael cannot speak and does not have limbs to thrash about, so he must therefore find other ways to express his frustrations and anger. These include a number of facial expressions, red flushes and body contortions.

Shires has played with language in the telling of this simple story with an array of alternative ways to say 'mad' that will have children grinning. As an aside, I think 'psycho' could have been omitted for its alternative connotations. Michael works through a series of actions to deal with his anger, introduced by the author speaking to the reader with a strategy to test. This switch in perspectives does inhibit the flow of the story a little.

The text is in solid bold black text large enough for young independent readers to manage easily. The layout is irregular, with inconsistent line spacing to give the appearance of verse that breaks up sentences in unusual spaces. The illustrations incorporate a mix of media, with caricature portrayals of the maggot and children. The use of dark greens and stylised etchings on the maggot's habitat is effective and provides a useful contrast to the pale and slug like body. Red – in many hues and strengths – has a key role in expressing the levels of anger. There is an abundance of white space on the pages that is disconcerting to the eye, and blank pages at either end indicate that a smaller format and further storyboarding may have provided a more polished end product.



# Book Review: The Mystery in the Garden: Wodge and Friends #1 by Carol Ann Martin Illustrator Sam Caldwell






- ▶ a story to tell about your engagement with kids' books during lockdown;
