#### Read Aloud to Your Child Every Day

Support for our national campaign is steadily progressing right across our state, interstate and now internationally. Twenty of 29 local Tasmanian Mayors have come on board, along with organisations such as CBCA National; IBBY, Book Links; WA Branch CBCA; International Read To Me Day; The Child Writes Fund; The Lighthouse (Toowoomba); Newtown and Darling Heights State School Community Hubs QLD – who have also gained the support of Community Hubs nationally - <a href="https://www.communityhubs.org.au/hubs/">https://www.communityhubs.org.au/hubs/</a>, with the intention to support through their Community Hubs and schools in NSW, SA, QLD & VIC.

Senator Catryna Bilyk, a previous early childhood educator, passionate about reading, is also championing our national campaign, writing to the Federal Minister for Education, the Hon. Jason Clare seeking his support and looking to organise a meeting with the Minister on his next visit to Tasmania.



We are currently exploring creating 20,000 bookmarks for distribution statewide - and possibly nationally (hopefully sponsored) - that will feature our message. There may well be other opportunities to promote our message as we progress.



# Vale Jessie Mahjouri Passionate about all things to do with children's literature

Since her sudden passing on 15 February 2024, tributes have flowed in for our dear friend and colleague, Jessie Mahjouri.

She had been a staunch supporter of CBCA Tasmania for decades and promoted literature and literacy throughout her life.

In 1990 when the Tasmanian Branch hosted the Awards ceremony in Launceston, Jessie and her willing team organised the most imaginative, fun and relevant lunch. Maurice Sendak's picture book, *Where the Wild Things Are*, provided the theme and the walls showcased children's gleeful interpretations of Max and his scary friends. Tables were decorated with picnic fare and several people wore swimming costumes for part of the lunch – reflecting Jessie's unrivalled creative flair.

Jessie continued to support CBCA in Tasmania over subsequent years, co-nominating our cherished mentor, Hugo McCann, for Life Membership of the organisation. With beautiful words and heartfelt sincerity, she acknowledged the tremendous impact that Hugo's teaching on literature for children and young people has had on so many of us bibliophiles.

In 2015, Jessie led the Children's Literature Festival on Bruny Island, *Book an Adventure*, luring writers, illustrators and drama teachers to work with an exuberant group of children and adult booklovers on a tiny island, near a small island, off the big island of Australia; only Jessie could have pulled it off.

In 2016, when CBCA Tas. took two bold initiatives, Jessie was immediately there with energy, enthusiasm and sheer hard work. Together with Patsy Jones & Nella and Richard Pickup, Jessie and Rod supported four events for The Year of Nan Chauncy and two major sessions for Hidden Stories, which showcased Indigenous ways of storytelling and drew large audiences.

It is hard to believe that Jessie, who personified vitality and loving energy, is no longer with us. The Children's Book Council of Australia joins Rod and Jessie's family in grieving for their loss and celebrating the rich life of Jessie Mahjouri.





## Book Review: The Diemen Alexander by Dr Marie Heitz

The Diemen Alexander, written by Dr Marie Heitz, a multitalented Tasmanian author, scientist and musician, provides an original and engaging story to challenge older teens and adults. When Luke, a keen photographer, and somewhat geeky teenager, visits the burnt and charred forests on kunanyi (Mt Wellington) he rescues a strange lizard-like creature that refuses to be left behind on the mountain. Back home in North Hobart, Luke is faced with the challenge of keeping Alexander secret from his scientist mother and her cunning and devious 'brother' (by circumstance rather than

blood). As Alexander's appetite expands in proportion to his size, this becomes more challenging. Predominantly this is Luke, sister Gatta, and Alexander's story but, circumstances require an increasing number of people to assist – starting with student palaeontologist Shona and expanding to include members from her local women's football team. This adds an array of diverse characters into the mix that add depth and breadth to the story line and provide a foil for Alexander to explore his unusual mental skills.


As an adult reader I was intrigued from the start, fascinated by the unfolding issues in regard to the rights and responsibilities of caring for a previously unknown creature. The incorporation of a reef of scientific support for the possible existence of



Alexander adds credibility to a science fiction tale that reads as a realistic fiction thriller. Embedded within are a series of moral and ethical dilemmas, the dangers of venture capitalism, and social issues - dysfunctional families, self-image, anorexia, sexual abuse, women in sport, controlling adults, greed and so much else.

Firmly situated in Tasmania, there are many recognisable places in and around Hobart and the south that Tasmanians will enjoy navigating as the team adopt increasingly bizarre ways to feed, transport and keep Alexander hidden from a materialistic world. *The Diemen Alexander* will keep readers engaged right to the end wondering just how Heitz can bring all the threads to a satisfactory conclusion. Something she does admirably for a satisfying and fulfilling read.




The 2024 Ena Noël Award winners will be announced on International Book Day April 2nd, 2024.



# 2024 Hans Christian Andersen Jury Recommends 20 Titles

The Hans Christian Andersen Jury, aiming to help build bridges of understanding, has created a list of twenty outstanding books from the 2024 nominees that they felt were important to merit translation everywhere so that children around the world could read them, thus expanding their access to some of the very best books.





The Watertower by Gary Crew and illustrated by Steven Woolman is on this prestigious list.





The Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA) is delighted to announce that the National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) book for 2024 is *Bowerbird Blues* by Aura Parker.

The NSS is held annually. In 2024 it will be on Wednesday 22 May at the new time of 12pm (AEST). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, family day cares, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 24th successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.

#### NSS aims to:

- promote the value of reading and literacy,
- promote the value and fun of books,
- promote an Australian writer and publisher,
- celebrate and promote Storytime activities in public libraries, school libraries, classrooms and communities around the country,
- and provide opportunities to involve parents, caregivers, the media, and others to participate in and enjoy the occasion.





Sally Rippin is Australia's highest-selling female author and has written over 100 books for children and young adults, many of them award-winning, including the popular Billie B Brown and Hey Jack! series, and the Polly and Buster trilogy. More recently, Sally has collaborated with Chris Kennett to create the School of Monsters series for beginning readers and with Eliza Hull to co-write Come Over to My House, illustrated by Daniel Gray-Barnett, exploring the lives of families who live with disabilities.

In 2022, Sally published a book for parents and educators, titled Wild Things: How We Learn to Read and What Can Happen If We Don't with the aim of creating awareness around neurodivergency and learning difficulties and how they may be best supported at home and in the classroom.

Currently, Sally is working on several books for children as well as adapting her work for the screen. Sally loves to write stories with heart and characters that resonate with children, parents and teachers alike. Her widely popular books are beloved across the globe and have sold more than ten million copies in eighteen countries.

Sally knows not every child finds it easy to read. During her two years, she will travel Australia talking about the many ways we can share stories, and support kids who might struggle to learn to read.

"My hope as Laureate is to ensure that all children can be supported to access reading in the way that suits them most."


