## **Exploring and enjoying the CBCA Short Listed/Notables Books with the North West Library Network**

On Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> March, fifteen people from school libraries across the North West, Devonport LINC and various CBCA (Tasmanian Branch) Executive and Committee members, met at Don College, Devonport. We enjoyed perusing both the Notable Books and the Short Listed Books especially those we hadn't read previously. Various people shared their innovative ideas and insights for encouraging children to engage with the books in the classroom and in the community library. Student responses to the activities that had been implemented in both primary and secondary schools represented at the meeting were shared. We appraised and justified the appropriate age and type of audience each of the short listed books would appeal to. Different themes were identified and plots and characterisations analysed and evaluated.

Overall we enjoyed an afternoon of immersion in the Notables and the Short Listed Books enhanced by a great afternoon tea.

## CBCA Book of the Year - Talks by our Tasmanian Judges, Karen Macpherson and Helen Rothwell, June 2017



#### Launceston – Petrarch's Bookshop

On Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> June those of us in the north and northwest of the state had the opportunity to listen to the knowledge, reflections and experiences of our judges Karen Macpherson and Helen Rothwell. The judges' talks were held at Petrarch's Bookshop in Brisbane St, Launceston. I would like to thank our friendly host Marcus Durkin and his staff for kindly providing such a relaxed and welcoming environment, it was lovely to be surrounded by tall walls of books and enjoy a pleasant Sunday afternoon. We had a pleasing number to people in the audience with a wide range of ages, literary backgrounds and interests. The talks were informative and engaging as our judges shared the richness and depth of their understanding and appreciation of the qualities and unique characteristics of each of the short listed books in their designated categories.

#### Hobart – Fahan School

Our Tasmanian CBCA judges' talks in Hobart on Tuesday, June 13 were also well attended and greatly enjoyed by the audience. Helen Rothwell, judge of the Eve Pownall award for information books, gave an overview of the judging process and described the painstaking, lengthy and at times passionate debates undertaken by the judging panels to select the shortlists and the Book of the Year for each category.

Karen Macpherson, Picture Book judge, spoke of the importance of picture books in a child's life and also noted that the target age range for this book category was up to 18 years. Karen discussed the major features of picture books: they are an introduction to literacy, but also extend literacy and encourage children to be writers; they express complex concepts in simple language; and they are an introduction to art. More than an object, a picture book is an experience which may be shared. Karen spoke of the need for illustrations to extend the text, the use of expressive fonts, and the importance of good production values including attention to details such as the endpapers. She described how these attributes were demonstrated by the six shortlisted books, which were passed around the admiring audience.

Helen Rothwell then discussed the rising number of information books which contain narrative or partly fictional elements. She noted that the age range for this category is also up to 18 years, and described what she looked for as a judge: age-appropriate works, original research, dynamic presentation, high-quality information, relevance and the ability to draw children in. She spoke enthusiastically about the merits of all the shortlisted books, and we were delighted to have shortlisted Tasmanian author-illustrator Jennifer Cossins present in the audience to hear her book praised. Helen also spoke about some of the Notables in her category, and three books that were in both categories.

On Thursday 29 June, CBCA Tasmania held the 2017 Readers' Cup Primary. This event was hosted by the Friends' School and saw 6 schools competing. They included:

Two schools, Glenora Primary School and Lenah Valley Primary School, entered teams for the first time. There was great excitement and the fun was easily measured from the huge smiles on the students' faces.

The books selected for the Primary competition included:

The Friends' Year 6 student, Zara Fenton, gave a beautiful introduction, detailing the history of the Readers' Cup in Tasmania. A quick straw poll of the Readers' Cup books revealed that 'Fish in a Tree' by

Lynda Mullaley Hunt was the clear favourite. The central character in this book is Ally, who is able to overcome academic and friendship issues in the story.

Teams quickly got down to part one of the Readers' Cup: answering the questions set by our experienced CBCA judges. Devonport Mayor, Steve Martin, capably filled the role of Quizmaster and students demonstrated their detailed knowledge of the books' characters, plot and themes. One of our judges, Jessie Mahjouri, commented on the excellent teamwork and communication evident during this part of the competition. Judge, Robbi Poynter, also noted their careful handwriting!

After a quick break, teams were invited to share their creative presentations. The effort and preparation students had made was evident. Their deep understanding of the texts, the connection between texts and their interpretation of the texts was clearly displayed. Simple costumes, relevant props and projected backdrops added to the diverse presentations. During each of the rounds, CBCA Life member, Patsy Jones diligently entered the results, keeping a cumulative score during the day.

The Friends' School were delightful hosts ensuring that tea and coffee were on hand for visitors and organising lunch for the CBCA team. There was even a homemade slice – delicious! After lunch, students completed the final round of the quiz and it was time for the winner to be announced.

MC, Meg Denman requested that each team reflect on the process and identify some of the strengths they had noted in the texts that were similar to their own, in preparing for the Readers' Cup. These included: teamwork, perseverance, kindness, communication, individuality, respect, patience, creativity and humour.

- Requesting photo permissions when schools register
- Clearer guidelines as to what role the teacher plays in preparing the team for the quiz and creative challenge beyond that which is currently outlined in the information notes

Congratulations to everyone who participated in the 2017 CBCA Readers' Cup. Congratulations also to the winning teams Tarremah Primary and The Friends' Secondary team whose presentations were innovative and most entertaining.

Winning teams and their teachers have been invited to the to attend the prestigious CBCA Book of the Year awards ceremony to be held at Government House, where the winners and honour books for the 2017 Book of the Year will be announced.


