Children's Book Week Shortlist Events

Launceston May 2024

It is always great fun when book enthusiasts come together, and when the draw card is children's literature then a room can hum! A mixed gathering of enthusiasts (teachers, teacher librarians and school library staff and more, including travellers from the south and the north west) met in the spacious Newstead College Library in late May to share a conversation about the short listed titles for the **2024 CBCA Book of the Year Awards.**



Thank you to committee member, **Dawn Clarke** for gathering most of the books and newcomer to Tasmania, Newstead College's **Judith Ridge**, for hosting the event and organising the smashing afternoon tea. This was provided by the College's students studying Cookery and Food and Hospitality Enterprise - what an array of delights! They always say a good story includes good food so we had the makings of a grand tale.



Treasurer, **Felicity Sly**, joined us and looked after our lucky door prizes, consisting of a range of Book Week merchandise, and to launch the CBCA Tas Raffle - visit cbcatas.org.au to get your tickets!



With four presenters, including three past judges, the audience was treated to a range of views and perspectives on books in each of the six categories. **Maureen Mann**, a regular reviewer in the newsletter and the blog, shared her wisdom in regard to themes, and the relationship between text and illustrations that make some books stand out. Maureen also identified some particular favourites in her coverage of the Picture Book (PB) and Early Childhood (EC) categories along with some thoughts on why some books were missed from both the Shortlist and the Notables - which prompted some interesting discussion on the Book of the Year judging processes.

Maureen's favourites:

PB: **Timeless** followed by **Every Night at Midnight**; Jennie Bales agreed and added **If I** was a Horse.

EC: Grace and Mr Milligan followed by Can You Teach a Fish to Climb a Tree? Jennie and Nella Pickup also loved Gymnastica Fantastica for the pure joy and energy it exudes.

Nella Pickup provided some deep insights on themes and issues in the Younger Readers (YR) category, and it was illuminating when she added some of her personal favourites from the Notables to add breadth - there were so many good books this year that didn't make it. Stay tuned for a blog post on these towards the end of July at cbcatas.blogspot.com.

Nella noted the breadth in audience evident in the short list. **Inside Jimmy Baxter** was a book of interest with the audience because of its challenging themes; and there was healthy discussion on this and **Scar Town** for primary age children - as a number of audience members had read these books with children.

Nella's favourites:

YR: **Scar Town, Being Jimmy Baxter** and **Huda was Here**. These were also Jennie's favourites; with Maureen choosing **Being Jimmy Baxter**.



Carol Fuller's long experience judging YA fiction was evident as she provided some useful background on the judging processes. She also talked about some current trends, including stereotypes in romances and an overabundance of issues being dealt with in many books, to the point of distraction.

In her analysis of the six titles in the Older Readers (OR) category Carol identified three clear favourites, with which Jennie heartily concurred.

OR: **Grace Notes** and **Inkflower:** the quality of the writing; deep coverage of significant themes; and engaging and meaningful storylines stood out. **Two Can Play that Game** is also a worthy contender.



Jennie Bales concluded the afternoon with the Eve Pownall (EP) titles and the New Illustrator (NI) selections. Jennie appreciated the diversity evident in non-fiction writing; with four favourites - all very different in presentation, content and target audience. Having not been able to read Eww Gross before the session started, she asked the participants for their views, and this was clearly a strong favourite and is certainly packed with gross information. There was time for a fairly short conversation on the New Illustrator books: again drawing on audience input for some titles; including When You're a Boy by Tasmanian author (and now illustrator), Blake Nuto. Nuto's books are reviewed in this issue.

Jennie's favourites:

EP: Australia: Country of Colour and Tamarra, and for older readers, Country Town and Democracy.

NI: Hope is a Thing (also Nella's pick) and When You're a Boy.

At the time of penning this report, Jennie has still not seen **Raised by Moths**.

Overall the session was a great success and feedback has been really positive. The combined efforts of a dedicated team made all the difference and some active members of the audience were a terrific bonus. It was also rewarding to get some media coverage with a great article in **The Examiner** on May 30. A second session presented by Jennie and Maureen was held at Leighland Christian School in Ulverstone on June 12.



Introducing the creative works of Blake Nuto

Blake Nuto is an author and illustrator living in Tasmania, with his family, and working in the education sector. His picture books encourage mindfulness and reflection on the human condition and our place in the world.

Blake's first picture book, **Child of Galaxies** (2020) is written in flowing
free verse and explores the meaning and
purpose of life and our place in this vast
galaxy, from a child's perspective. It
embraces both the joyful and the
challenging events that a young child
might face, to celebrate the wonder and
uncertainty of life as a thing to treasure.
The text is hand-written in bold font and
weaves across the whimsical and
colourful illustrations by **Charlotte Ager** that incorporate several children
from different nationalities and with
diverse family groupings.



A great book to encourage some philosophical thinking in young inquiring minds.

A Day That's Ours (2022) celebrates a loving relationship between a father and young child on the day before school starts. The two make the most of having a free day to spend together and explore the world around them. Taking the time to ponder on their experiences and all that they see and explore, Nuto's book is full of love, sharing and caring about the little joys in life. Vyara

Boyadjieva's soft whimsical illustrations are full of expression, laughter, movement and joy as the two investigate their local environment. Soft pastel colours provide backgrounds for



bolder shades to highlight items such as the tree trunks to hide behind, and the autumn leaves scudding across the park. Clear font and bolded lettering for active language highlight movement, expression and feelings on each page. A lovely book to stimulate reflection on the joy in everyday events.


Nuto's most recent publication, **When You're a Boy**, has been shortlisted in the **2024 CBCA New Illustrator category** and it is interesting to see how Nuto has applied a completely different illustrative style and colour palette, to that used by those who have illustrated his previous books. Bold water colour brush stokes fill the double page spreads and dominate the story (see blakenuto.com/home-1). The father and son are almost insignificant in this vast landscape, and this seems to add strength to the message

conveyed. Whilst wandering through different landscapes – forests, mountains, rivers and fields - the father imparts his wisdom; to encourage and celebrate a range of softer traits traditionally applied to females. The text highlights the importance of emotions to express joy, contentment and understanding; rather than more masculine physicality and aggressiveness and offers a model for boys to engage with others.

'When you're a boy
you are told how to be
just like the white-roaring oceans.
But I've learned
the fierceness of flowers
the glory of colour
and the beauty of dreaming.'



The text, presented across the painted spreads is short - a phrase or sentence on each page. However, this apparent simplicity tackles deeper societal issues, in an accessible way for young children.





Vale Hugo McCann Jennie Connor's tribute to Hugo McCann read at his memorial

Hugo McCann has had an unbelievable influence on knowledge and pedagogy relating to literacy & literature education in Tasmania - the place that fortuitously, Hugo & Ida decided to call home.

From 1976 Hugo initiated, developed and co-conducted the Literature for Children course in the B Ed program at the TCAE and the University of Tasmania. Hugo then designed and presented the Masters program, Literature for Children and Young People, until 1994. A significant number of Tasmanian educators experienced Hugo's academic courses and many, many more enjoyed his lectures, seminars and workshops offered through the Children's Book Council, the Australian Literacy Educators Association and the Australian Teachers of English.

We were dazzled by Hugo's knowledge, erudition & insight:

- "We had no idea that picture books could carry such emotional and philosophical weight."
- "He brought the genius of novelists such as Susan Cooper, Ursula Le Guin, Patricia Wrightson and Alan Garner to our receptive minds and hearts."
- "Hugo developed our capacity for a love of literature and informed critical commentary that we have taken into our work with children and young people for the rest of our lives."
- "Ex students now middle aged tell me that they always, always read to their children because we convinced them of the importance of story; that's a legacy that goes on and on, Hugo."

Hugo's dedication to the Children's Book Council never wavered: Hugo & colleague John Shelton took turns representing Tas as judges for the CBCA book awards; Hugo researched the evidence to support our bid to the Board of Myer, which enabled CBCA to receive \$500,000 to be invested for prize money; and he gave the oration for the 2016 **Year of Nan Chauncy** event.

To quote from Hugo's Acceptance speech when CBCA conferred on him Life Membership, after his contribution of thirty years:

'Everything I do with work for the young draws on my experience as a child of about eight or nine: hearing Blind Pew's stick on the West Country Road in the opening to Treasure Island; ...I was with Jim and Long John, Squire Trelawney and Dr Livesey on the sailing ship Hispaniola'... 'I just liked stories with engaging characters and satisfying outcomes.' But Hugo wasn't just a book worm who shared his love of literature. His was a wide-ranging intellect and insatiable curiosity about the world of ideas. Hugo once quoted Jean-Paul Satre 'a man is always a teller of tales...he sees everything that happens to him through them; and he tries to live his life as if he were telling a story'. And what a story, Hugo's life has been. We mourn his loss & celebrate his contribution to our lives. We conclude with Hugo's words: 'I found the CBC an organisation that shared delight in both writers and young readers. It took the magic of story and language very seriously, the magic pudding of story that young Australians can enjoy. CBC provided, encouraged and sustained an excitement with stories shareable with the young. And it still does every year. It was easy to volunteer to share in the efforts being made by the Council. The conclusion of my thanks for Life Membership is a cry of gratitude to the long line of those who have created and maintained CBC as a cultural treasure.'
