On a recent visit, we were very fortunate that Her Excellency Sam Mostyn Governor General of Australia provided the opportunity to meet and talk about our Read Aloud To Your Child Every Day national campaign. The visit was coordinated by Bianca Hankey & Evie Lintner both from Toast for Kids, using the East Devonport Child Learning Centre as a venue and inviting representatives from the Country Women's Association, East Devonport Primary School, Our Lady of Lourdes and of course local families and children. Congratulations to Bianca & Evie for coordinating this visit, we have had wonderful feedback.



Her Excellency, conveyed strong willingness to assist with the national campaign, offering to support in any way possible, including gaining government research on benefits of reading aloud.

The opportunity to read aloud to the children and parents, from our book Tassie Rhymes for Little Tigers, was also taken up by Her Excellency.

Our next step is to follow up Her Excellency on the offer for research, perhaps requiring a visit to Canberra.

Parliamentary Friends of Children's Literacy

With the recent election done and dusted work now needs to commence in reignite this important group. There have been ministry & shadow ministry reshuffles with the Ministry for Early Childhood Education now taken on by Senator Jess Walsh (VIC), with Shadow Ministry by Jonathon Duniam (TAS).

Members and Senators will be contacted by the Speaker of The House,



at a time yet to be determined, to express interest in government groups. They will also be made aware of our Read Aloud campaign (the whole 226 parliamentarians!). Correspondence has already been sent to both Senators Walsh & Duniam highlighting the Parliamentary Friends Group, requesting an opportunity to meet and discuss the Read Aloud campaign, and seeking supporting for our Creators in Schools Workshops, which support local-based creators.

Rosie's Reading

Jennie Bales (CBCA Tas), Evie Lintner (T4K) and I attended the launch of **Rosie's Reading** on Wednesday 18th June at St. Lukes Wellness Centre in Launceston; donating a carton of Read Aloud bookmarks and 25 copies of our book.

Rosie's Reading is a Tasmanian partnership with United Way Australia and the Dolly Parton Imagination Library with the aim to provide children (who enrol) with a book, each month, until they reach the age of 5. Each book is posted direct to child's address, with the aim to foster a love of reading and provide all the associated benefits from regular reading to and with a child.

At the launch Leanne McLean (Peter Underwood Centre for Educational Attainment) and Rick Marton (Pres. Rosie's Reading) provided inspiring presentations about the benefits of reading to our children from birth; both relating anecdotes from their own childhood experiences.

Books provided by Rosie's Reading are funded via the generosity of community - no child/family pays for the opportunity. The cost of each book delivered monthly is estimated to be \$9; this equates to \$540 per child if enrolled from birth. 28, 000 birth are predicted rate in the next 5 years, so this is a big undertaking. The Board is taking a steady approach by gradually spreading the opportunity suburb by suburb, commencing in Launceston.

Upon hearing about Rosie's Reading, we contacted them promoting our Read Aloud To Your Child Every Day campaign. Rosie's Reading have received a personalised Read Aloud signature and banner to promote the message. This organisation is very active in this literacy space and has strong connections with Rotary. Rotary District Governor Craig Perkins is aware of our campaign from a recent presentation to their District meeting promoting Read Aloud. So partnership opportunities abound here as well.

Northern Primary Readers' Cup

CBCA Tasmania proudly supports and encourages school students to engage with literature and reading in a variety of ways. One avenue is to support the various Readers' Cup (RC) events held in the state.


The first of these involved students in the north of the state and as far afield as Flinders Island. RC is organised by stakeholders in schools (teacher librarians - in this case Jessica Marston at Hagley School, school library staff and teachers). With support from Petrach's Bookshop in Launceston CBCA Tasmania provided book vouchers to each of the participating schools including a First Prize voucher to the winning team. Well done Longford Primary School!

On the 29th May 2025, 18 schools represented by 90 students, along with supporting teachers, school staff and volunteers, gathered at Hagley Primary School for another Readers' Cup event.


With a great deal of practice and experience to draw on, Jessica Marston and a swathe of hardworking support people, ensured an efficient, memorable and fascinating event. The excited children displayed their commitment to reading and engaging deeply with children's literature as they demonstrated their depth of reading and creativity in the ways they responded to the different books.

The evening started with an on-the-spot Extra Challenge. Having pre-read *The Truck Cat* by Deborah Frenkel, they were provided with a challenge to design a purpose-built cat carrier for the cat. The end results were amazing and very hard to judge as all groups included original ideas in the designs.





This was followed by the Quiz - the most important part of the event and worth the highest proportion of possible marks. Students answered a range of questions about each of the six books across five rounds. The Quiz was based on five books suiting a range of abilities and interests.



The final section, and highlight for the large audience in attendance, was the Creative Response. Each participating group identified one title and prepared a response with the intent of sharing feelings about that book and the deeper themes and messages shared by the author. This was shown in a variety of ways: through drama, the use of technology, poetry and artistic expression such as a diorama.

CBCA Short List Talks

The recent Short List talks held at Claremont College Library in Hobart and Scotch Oakburn Junior School Library in Launceston were a great success. Thirty attendees in the south and a smaller group in the north were keen participants and it was wonderful to have their input and reactions to some of the books expressed. This added depth and breadth to the discussions conducted by the panel who had dedicated considerable time to reading the books and considering their value in terms of the quality of the submissions.

Many thanks to the this committed team including Maureen Mann, Carol Fuller and Jennie Bales, and to Nella Pickup and Judith Ridge who joined us in Launceston.

There was interesting discussion around the different categories. Some of the points of interest raised by the panel and the participants included:

- The lack of books suitable for the lower end of the Young Adult category
- A strong focus on popular easy read material in the Younger Reader category
- The high quality of the Eve Pownall category with many outstanding books on the Notable list that would have made selection of the Short List challenging
- The limitation of Early Childhood books for an age range of 0 to 6. Many of the entries targeted the more familiar and expected age range of 0 to 8. In schools the label 'Early Childhood' embraces both Years 1 and 2. Overall the shortlist and many of the notables targeted this broader range
- In the north we finally got to see *Peek-a-Boo Lottie* (thanks Rebecca) and all agreed that this was definitely a cut above the books on the Early childhood list. It would have been better entered there than in the New Illustrator list. Both the text and the illustrations worked in such a clever and harmonious way

Discussions during the Short List talks in both the South and the North demonstrated that there was a general feeling that there were some books that did not make the Shortlist, particularly in the Younger Reader category, or, sadly, were not identified as Notable titles either. This may have been due to the fact that they were not submitted by the publishers for consideration in the awards.



From the Notable Younger Reader list,

Midwatch by Judith Rossell and We Do Not Welcome Our Ten-Year Old Overlord by Garth Nix are two excellent titles suited to upper primary readers.








Rosie's Reading


We're excited to announce that the first suburbs are now live and accepting registrations!

Revolution & Silence includes an installation by Tasmanian artist Brigita Ozolins in the gallery of the Allport Library and Museum of Fine Arts. The exhibition considers George Orwell's 1984, exploring the forces that try to silence free speech and the revolutions that rise in response. These works contextualise Orwell's novel amongst contemporary political upheaval, AI, fake news, and the unchecked power of social media.

The State Library and Archives of Tasmania has curated and displayed a collection of books that have been challenged throughout history, and today. This exhibition represents and interprets diverse points of view through a collection of banned, restricted and controversial books. GENRE READING BY REGION

Three categories consistently dominated the top five most popular ebook genres across Australia's states and territories and throughout New Zealand: Humour (fiction), Comic & Graphic Books, and Fantasy.

However, there was some regional variety in the fourth and fifth categories:

The most popular audiobook genres were just slightly different than the ebook genres. The four genres that were most popular across all regions (except the Northern Territory) were Humour, Fantasy, Comic & Graphic Books, and Mystery. The fifth and final category varied by region:

Australian Capital Territory: Mythology	Tasmania: YA Romance
New South Wales: Suspense	Victoria: YA Romance
Queensland: Suspense	Western Australia: YA Romance
South Australia: Historical Fiction	

The Northern Territory's most popular genres differed from the rest of the country, with Mystery and Short Stories topping their list, but Humour and Comics & Graphic Books not making the top listens.


