Devonport Readers' Cup

The 8th Devonport Readers' Cup was conducted on Friday November 8 at Devonport Primary School. This year, nine school teams from Kentish, Latrobe and Devonport municipalities competed, with the results in each category being very tight.

Courtesy of sponsorship from Kentish, Latrobe & Devonport Councils; Radio 7AD & Sea FM; Children's Book Council of Australia (Tasmania Branch), each team member received a participation certificate recognising their efforts; the Quizmaster and the Creative Challenge winning teams each received a trophy, school book voucher and a silver medallion; and the overall winner received a trophy, school book voucher, gold medal, the perpetual Devonport Readers' Cup and bragging rights for a year.



Each school participating in the Cup entered a team of six students, who competed in the Quizmaster category answering questions across the six assigned books; then the teams

competed in the Creative Challenge presenting their interpretation on one or more of the chosen books, and were assigned points for their performance, by guest judges.



Hillcrest Primary School achieved a clean sweep of this year's Devonport Readers' Cup winning both the Quizmaster and Creative Challenge categories, resulting in being crowned the Overall Winners. In the short history of the Devonport Readers' Cup, this is the first time such a result has occurred. Congratulations to all the teams who competed.

Reflecting on the past few eventful months

- 1. EVENT: The recent passing of government legislation the *Online Safety Amendment* (Social Media Minimum Age) Bill 2024 a measure to deliver greater protections for young people during critical stages of their development. The laws place the onus on social media platforms to take reasonable steps to prevent Australians under 16 years of age from having accounts.
 - The minimum age will apply to 'age-restricted social media platforms' as defined in the Bill, including Snapchat, TikTok, Facebook, Instagram, X and others.
 - The Bill was passed by the Senate 34 to 19 on Thursday 27th November.
 - REFLECTION: We are taking away a medium that our young people use every day, but are replacing it with naught. Here is an opportunity for literature and reading to be promoted on all levels to fill that void. Both can be enjoyed in school, home and other settings, as books are transportable.
- 2. EVENT: Media coverage on youth crime this looks (and most likely for those concerned) very frightening, and presumably costly through loss and damage especially in Queensland. The media is correct that in some states/territories, that over the past 12 months there has been a rise in youth crime, however, over the past decade national crime statistics show that youth crime has dropped by approximately 30%. Additionally, many news reports overstate the extent of youth crime because they do not consider or communicate the extent of repeat offending.


REFLECTION:

- a. Items stolen by young people were often groceries, fuel, cigarettes and alcohol, which align with the price hikes seen with these items.
- b. Young people are struggling in a rental and housing crisis, in which long-term safe and affordable housing options are becoming harder to find.
- c. The increase in theft of items such as groceries and fuel, points to young people being unable to afford necessities.
- d. Currently the youth unemployment rate is 9.3% October 2024 (ABS); Unemployment rate remains the same at 4.1%
- e. Environmental circumstances and background certainly play a role here, and we know through a wide range of reports that most link with areas of disadvantage. We also know that areas of disadvantage have low educational and literacy rates, are associated with poverty, and resulting in lessened prospects of gaining employment especially well-paid employment.
- 3. EVENT: NAPLAN data release in 2023 and more recently in 2024 mirrored one another showing that one in three school students throughout Australia are not meeting minimum numeracy and literacy expectations, and one in ten are so far behind they need additional support. Furthermore, over decades Tasmania still suffers from an illiteracy rate of 50%. REFLECTION
 - Two consecutive years of nationwide results highlight high levels of illiteracy. Of course these issues need to be immediately addressed at the coalface, but what is the root of the problem? We know that there are households that do not have any books or that books are a very low priority with rent, food, petrol being top of the list. As is reported educational outcomes also suffer.
- 4. EVENTS: War, domestic violence, skill shortage, cost of living, housing crises the list goes on.

So where does CBCA's purpose "To enrich young lives through Australian stories," and our Mission "To connect, communicate, celebrate, and advocate for the value of stories" fit in? Something to further ponder on, not only by those of us in the literacy and literature worlds, but also for those who make decisions on our behalf.

Book sales

Overall Market

- YTD Oct 2023: -0.3% downturn in book sales in Australia
- 2022, was a significant record-breaker for book sales in Australia.
- 2023 is still significantly higher than 2019, with very healthy 16% growth.
- 2% growth in adult fiction sales between 2022 and 2023

Number of books sold YTD in Australia (1 Jan 2023 – 7 Oct 2023)

- 47 million books sold in Australia
- \$903 million in value
- Average sale price of \$19.17
- · Average of 29% discount off RRP
- Inflation is affecting spending, for example, a basket of goods in 2021 that cost \$100, in 2023 now costs \$118.
- BookScan has noticed a shift to book sales in discount department stores. In 2022, 31% of print books were purchased at stores such as Big W, Kmart etc but YTD 2023 it has risen to 33%. In order of volume, the book sales going through the discount department stores are mostly children's titles, followed by fiction, followed by non-fiction.
- Black Friday promotions have a big effect on book sales, with 440,000 more books (approx. 32% more) being sold during the week of Black Friday than in the average week of the previous 4 weeks! (Claire also noted that consumers were tending to shop earlier for Christmas and stock up when goods were on sale.)


